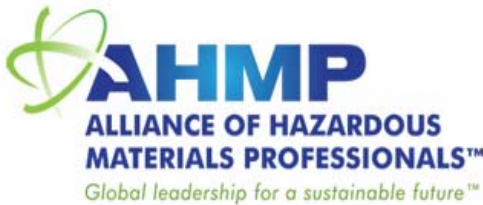

## EHMM Course Scheduled: March 17 – 19, 2010

The EWC will be hosting the Essentials of Hazardous Materials Management (EHMM) at the Consolidated Information Center, at Washington State University-Tri Cities, from March 17<sup>th</sup> through 19<sup>th</sup>. This course is designed as a preparation for the Certified Hazardous Materials Manager® (CHMM®) examination. The EHMM provides instruction about laws and regulations as well as technologies and practices. It highlights topics and information hazardous materials managers need to know to better perform their jobs. The EHMM is endorsed by the United States Department of Energy's National Environmental Training Office.

The course is a cross-training tool that helps environmental, health, safety and security professionals quickly and effectively obtain knowledge in new areas as well as areas that have been added to their job responsibilities. It also helps those new to the profession gain a foundation and prepare for the CHMM® designation examination.

Additionally, those who already have earned the CHMM® designation can take Essentials of Hazardous Materials Management (EHMM) to obtain annual Credential Maintenance Points (CMPs).

## AHMP 2009 Conference

Many EWC members attended the National Conference of the Alliance of Hazardous Materials Professionals™ (AHMP), formerly the Academy of Certified Hazardous Materials Managers (ACHMM) held in San Diego, CA, August 30<sup>th</sup> – September 2<sup>nd</sup>. AHMP is comprised of more than 50 chapters in 37 states and more than 4,000 hazardous materials professionals throughout the world. Nearly 700 hazardous materials and EHS&S professionals from around the country and the world attended the AHMP conference this year at the San Diego Sheraton Hotel & Marina.

The theme of the conference was "EHS&S — Steering a Course for Sustainability." The AHMP awards program was held on September 1<sup>st</sup>. Awards were presented to recognize outstanding contributions in education, training, research, development, operations and performance advancing the association's mission in environmental, health, safety and security (EHS&S) professions.

The EWC received the Honor Roll of Champions Award. Also, the EWC 2009 Champions of Excellence honorees were: Andrea L. Prignano, Raja Ranade, Rhonda "Roni" Swan, and Rampur Viswanath.

# Regulatory News

## SPCC Amendments Implementation Delayed

On December 5, 2008, EPA amended the Spill Prevention Control, and Countermeasures (SPCC) rule to provide increased clarity with respect to specific regulatory requirements, to tailor requirements to particular industry sectors, and to streamline certain rule requirements. The Agency subsequently delayed the effective date of these amendments to January 14, 2010, to allow the Agency time to review the amendments to ensure that they properly reflect consideration of all relevant facts. EPA also requested public comment on the delay of the effective date and its duration, and on the December 2008 amendments. Having reviewed the record for the amendments and the additional comments, EPA has decided to make only limited changes to the amendments. With respect to the majority of the December amendments, EPA is either taking no action or providing minor technical corrections. EPA is, however, removing the following provisions in the December 2008 amendments: the exclusion of farms and oil production facilities from the loading/unloading rack requirements; the exemption for produced water containers at an oil production facility; and the alternative qualified facility eligibility criteria for an oil production facility. This final rule is effective on January 14, 2010, published in the Federal Register on November 13, 2009, page 58784.

## Tougher Air Quality Standards Proposed for Sulfur Dioxide

For the first time in nearly 40 years, EPA is proposing to strengthen the nation's sulfur dioxide (SO<sub>2</sub>) air quality standard to protect public health. Power plants and other industrial facilities emit SO<sub>2</sub> directly into the air. EPA indicated that exposure to SO<sub>2</sub> can aggravate asthma, cause respiratory difficulties, and result in emergency room visits

and hospitalization. People with asthma, children, and the elderly are especially vulnerable to SO<sub>2</sub>'s effects.

EPA is taking comment on a proposal to establish a new national one-hour SO<sub>2</sub> standard, between 50 and 100 parts per billion (ppb). This standard is designed to protect against short-term exposures ranging from five minutes to 24 hours. Because the revised standards would be more protective, EPA is proposing to revoke the current 24-hour and annual SO<sub>2</sub> health standards. EPA also is proposing changes to monitoring and reporting requirements for SO<sub>2</sub>. Monitors would be placed in areas with high SO<sub>2</sub> emission levels as well as in urban areas. Additionally, the proposal would change the Air Quality Index to reflect the revised SO<sub>2</sub> standards. This change would improve states' ability to alert the public when short-term SO<sub>2</sub> levels may affect their health.

It should be noted that the proposed rule addresses only the SO<sub>2</sub> primary standards, which are designed to protect public health. EPA will address the secondary standard — designed to protect the public welfare, including the environment — as part of a separate proposal in 2011.

EPA first set National Ambient Air Quality Standards for SO<sub>2</sub> in 1971, establishing both a primary standard to protect health and a secondary standard to protect the public welfare. Annual average SO<sub>2</sub> concentrations have decreased by more than 71 percent since 1980.

The public comment period will be open for 60 days after the proposal is published in the Federal Register. The agency will hold a public hearing on Jan. 5, 2010 in Atlanta. EPA must issue final standards by June 2, 2010.
